### **Public Participation:**

It is the policy of the Approval Authority to encourage and permit public participation and comment on matters within the Approval Authority's jurisdiction, as follows.

- Public Comment on Agenda Items. The Approval Authority will take public comment on each item on the agenda. The Approval Authority will take public comment on an action item before the Approval Authority takes any action on that item. Persons addressing the Approval Authority on an agenda item shall confine their remarks to that particular agenda item. For each agenda item, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the public comment on an agenda item to less than three minutes per speaker, based on the nature of the agenda item, the number of anticipated speakers for that item, and the number and anticipated duration of other agenda items.
- General Public Comment. The Approval Authority shall include general public comment as an agenda item at each meeting of the Approval Authority. During general public comment, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority on matters within the Approval Authority's jurisdiction. Issues discussed during general public comment must not appear elsewhere on the agenda for that meeting. Each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once during general public comment, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the total general public comment to 30 minutes and may limit the time allocated to each speaker depending on the number of speakers during general public comment and the number and anticipated duration of agenda items.
- *Speaker Identification*. Individuals making public comment may be requested, but not required, to identify themselves and whom they represent.
- Designated Public Comment Area. Members of the public wishing to address the Approval Authority must speak from the public comment area.
- Comment, Not Debate. During public comment, speakers shall address their remarks to the Approval Authority as a whole and not to individual Approval Authority representatives, the General Manager or Management Team members, or the audience. Approval Authority Representatives and other persons are not required to respond to questions from a speaker. Approval Authority Representatives shall not enter into debate or discussion with speakers during public comment, although Approval Authority Representatives may question speakers to obtain clarification. Approval Authority Representatives may ask the General Manager to investigate an issue raised during public comment and later report to the Approval Authority. The lack of a response by the Approval Authority to public comment does not necessarily constitute agreement with or support of comments made during public comment.

Speaker Conduct. The Approval Authority will not tolerate disruptive conduct by
individuals making public comment. Speakers who use profanity or engage in yelling,
screaming, or other disruptive behavior will be directed to cease that conduct and may be
asked to leave the meeting room.

(RCPGP) as follows: • FY 2019 - \$1,406,550 for Life Sustaining Commodity Distribution Planning • FY 2020 - \$929,414 for Regional Pandemic Preparedness.

### **Discussion/Description:**

### (a) Notification of Subrecipient Award FY 21 (Discussion Only)

On December 27, 2020, the president signed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021 to fund the Federal Government for the remainder of the current fiscal year. Highlights of the legislation are as follows:

• \$705 million for the Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI), including \$90 million for the UASI Nonprofit Security Grant Program;

Note: (FEMA has recently announced significant changes in both the Risk Profile Methodology as well as the FY 2021 NOFO)

- \$20 million transferred from the Office of the Secretary for Targeted Violence and Terrorism Prevention grants;
- \$402.3 million for the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, including funding the Securing the Cities (STC) program.

### (b) Management Team Update (Discussion)

### **UASI Grant Program**

<u>Project Manager Position (Training and Exercise)</u> - The position will work under the direction of the Training and Exercise Program Manager, facilitating and coordinating the quarterly work group meetings

and implementing regional training and exercises. The job announcement has been published. We are reviewing applications and scheduling interviews for the position.

Grants Specialist Position (Training and Exercise) – Karen Tsang has been hired to work with the training and exercise group to process grant expenditures and other financial related work. She has solid experience as an auditor, a tax accountant, and a government accounting finance professional. Karen has worked for the San Francisco Dept. Public Health, analyzing, and tracking expenditures for over 50+ capital projects. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Management Science at the University of California, San Diego, and is proficient with financial software and numerous software languages.

Emergency Services Coordinator I Position (Training and Exercise)- The position will work with the Training and Exercise Program Manager performing administrative functions, including assisting with the planning, coordination and development of regional initiatives, plans, and processes. A significant component of this position requires excellent written skills. The job announcement been published and we will be reviewing applications and scheduling interviews for the position.

### Securing the Cities (STC) Program

<u>Program Manager Position</u> – SFPD Captain Dominic Yin has been hired to serve as the Program Manager and will work with the General Manager to oversee and implement the policies/requirements of the STC grant program, including chairing/facilitating the Principal Partners Committee, reporting/coordinating the region's strategies and capabilities with the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction (CWMD) office and State/Local stakeholders. Captain Yin retired from the SFPD after working for more than twenty-five years on various assignments. He is familiar with the STC program and has been a member of the Principal Partners Committee since its establishment. Captain Yin is also an attorney and a member of the California State Bar.

Project Manager Position – Chief Dave Rocha who retired as Fire Chief for Alameda County has been hired to serve as the Project Manager for the region's Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, Explosive (CBNRE) program. He will be working with the General Manager and Program Manager to facilitate the STC subcommittee meetings, developing/coordinating the training/exercise program and equipment procurement, and assisting with the National Priority Projects that involve Chem-Bio. Chief Rocha worked for the Alameda County Fire Department for more than twenty-five years in various roles. As Fire Chief, Dave was responsible for strategic leadership in all areas of emergency preparedness, including coordinating/strategizing with local, State and Federal stakeholders in all areas of CBRNE.

<u>Grants Specialist Position</u> – Ethan Baker has accepted a promotional opportunity to work as a grant specialist within the STC group to process grant expenditures and other financial related work. As an Emergency Services Coordinator, Ethan gained solid grant experience in the areas of grant compliance, procurement, project monitoring and website administration. He will be assisting the Program Manager with the necessary grant requirements such as: analyzing grant milestones, initiating/delivering reports, tracking expenditures, and performing procurement activities.

<u>Emergency Services Coordinator I Position</u> - The position will work with the STC Program Manager performing administrative functions, including assisting with the planning, coordination and development of regional initiatives, plans, and processes. A significant component of this position requires excellent written skills. The job announcement been published and we will be reviewing applications and scheduling interviews for the position.

### **Background**

The FY21 UASI Project Proposal Guidance states that the Bay Area UASI Management Team will report all regional proposal submissions to the Approval Authority, along with funding recommendations based on the region's risk and gaps as well as funding availability.

Listed in Table One below are regional sustainment projects and regional projects vetted at a UASI workgroup meeting prior to the October 9, 2020 proposal submission deadline. There are three (3) sustainment projects: training and exercise, fusion center, and public safety information sharing. These projects will be presented directly to the Approval Authority, along with an Annual Report, in today's meeting. Regional projects are described in Table One.

### **Discussion**

Please note that the Management Team's current funding recommendations for the regional projects assumes that our FY21 grant will be the same as last year, with the State retaining the same percentage of the grant as last year (i.e. 17.5%).

The Management Team will provide final funding recommendations once DHS announces the FY21 grant award amount, likely at the June Approval Authority meeting. At that time, the Approval Authority will also review/approve all hub projects recommended by hub voting members.

In FY 20, the sustainment projects were funded in the amount of \$8,812,873 and the other proposed regional projects, including four National Priority Projects, were funded in the amount of \$6,537,800. The amount for all regional funding for FY 20 totaled \$15,350,673.

The total regional funding amount requested in FY 21, including the sustainment projects is \$18,421,473.

The Management Team recommends funding the FY 21 sustainment projects in the amount of \$11,243,473, the four (4) National Priority Projects in the amount of \$6,200,000, and the three (3) other regional projects in the amount of \$199,000. The total amount of National Priority and regional projects is \$\$6,399,000 with the total amount recommended for all FY21 sustainment, national priority and regional project funding is \$17,642,473.

The following information is being provided to give an overview of the fusion center's activities from January 1 to December 31, 2020.



### INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY—CYBER

**Personnel assigned:** Four (4)


<u>Duties:</u> Cyber team members improve regional resilience by sharing cyber threat intelligence and by providing incident support during cyber events. NCRIC Cyber Team members currently sit on six (6) Cyber-related Boards and Committees.

<u>Activities:</u> In 2020 the Cyber Team emerged as the key regional contact for agencies experiencing ransomware attacks. In addition to triaging cyber threat information, the Cyber Team delivered key cyber incident support during 15 active ransomware attacks in the region, building cases for federal partners and sharing that threat information with stakeholders so that other potential victims could protect themselves.



### **DIGITAL FORENSIC EVIDENCE LABORATORY**

The NCRIC continues to support the Digital Forensic Evidence Lab (DFEL), which reviews data stored on computers and other portable electronic devices. This work assists in efforts to arrest and convict those engaging in criminal acts.





### STRATEGY, INFRASTRUCTURE, AND ANALYSIS (SIA) UNIT

Personnel assigned: Four (4)

<u>Duties:</u> The SIA is the NCRIC lead for Critical Infrastructure and Key Resources (CIKR), vulnerability and threat assessments, national data calls for special events and CIKR, special/large-scale event support, and strategic intelligence products and research. The SIA provides support for events based on the potential risk of criminal activity, provides real-time information sharing, and in-depth strategic analysis of regional threats.

<u>Activities:</u> In 2020, in addition to coordinating Real-time Open-Source Analysis (ROSA) of threats to public safety, creating a COVID-19 dashboard for the NCRIC AOR, and assessing vulnerabilities of CIKR during pandemic conditions, SIA wrote intelligence products on caravan robberies, transnational crime organizations, elections concerns, threats from unmanned aerial systems, and a region-wide threat assessment in collaboration with the State Threat Assessment Center (STAC) and other California fusion centers.





### PRIVATE SECTOR OUTREACH


Personnel assigned: One (1)

<u>Duties:</u> Develop/facilitate participation by owners and operators to protect critical infrastructure; provide vetted members with highly valued, sensitive information and intelligence; enhance private sector engagement capabilities.

Activities: During 2020, the team temporarily adapted its private sector engagement efforts to the Covid-19 environment which included a modified outreach strategy, along with webinar-based training and information sharing opportunities for its members. The team partnered closely with the FBI InfraGard Program to increase participation by the private sector in this modified strategy. Despite these temporary program changes the team added its largest number of new members in a single year.




### ANALYTICAL SUPPORT (NCRIC-TAG, Priority Crimes, CSU)

Personnel assigned: Nineteen (19)

<u>Duties:</u> Intake, vet, analyze, and share tips, leads, suspicious activity reports, information, and intelligence on foreign and domestic terrorism, criminal activity or threats to life; regularly collaborate and coordinate with federal, state, local, tribal, and territorial public safety partners, other fusion centers, private sector, faith-based community, and other security partners in our region and nationally to enhance threat information and mitigate risks; provide analytical support for requests for information; develop intelligence products, briefings, threat assessments, or strategic communications regarding regional criminal and terrorism activity trends and patterns; provide investigative and real-time event support; and the Gun-Related Intelligence Program in Santa Clara County.

<u>Activities:</u> In 2020 there was over a 32% increase Suspicious Activity Reports (SARs), which were deconflicted and vetted to determine a criminal and/or a terrorism nexus, and nearly a 300% increase in case support requests, in which analysts often provide in-depth data-driven analytical products and/or courtroom testimony. Intelligence background package requests decreased during 2020.



### **TRAINING FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2020**


In 2020, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the fusion center adapted to the public health threat environment by using a virtual technological platform to conduct online training classes. These classes related to homeland security, narcotics enforcement, law enforcement officer safety and investigative techniques. Approximately 62 classes were put on and 4,992 students from allied agencies and organizations attended.

#### **PILOT PROJECTS**

The NCRIC/NCHIDTA participated in and/or chaired several national and local pilot projects in 2020, including:

### **Threat to Life Projects**

- This year the NCRIC continued two pilot projects that focused on immediate and implied threat to life reporting. The first project was initiated at the request of the FBI's San Francisco Field Division to develop an immediate threat to life mitigation process with some of the world's largest social media companies. The project was developed in partnership with several social media companies and the Western States Information Network (WSIN) to identify and triage on-line threats involving the potential imminent danger of death or serious physical injury. The NCRIC process has saved the lives of potential victims across the United States and the world. The pilot project helped initiate a national task team formed that is developing recommendations for tip, lead, and threat to life management processes. The team was formed by the US DOJ Bureau of Justice Assistance's Global Advisory Committee and Criminal Intelligence Coordinating Council. The task team is co-chaired by a NCRIC member.
- The second project was initiated in partnership with the FBI's Office of Partner Engagement and Criminal Justice Information System's National Threat Operations Center (NTOC) to develop an immediate threat to life mitigation process to triage threats received by the FBI. The NTOC process has saved the lives of potential victims across the United States.

### **Discussion:**

BayRICS General Manager Corey Reynolds will provide an annual report on the BayRICS 2020 achievements in voice and data interoperability in a PowerPoint presentation. 



## BayRICS Sustainment Strategy

- Since FY14, BayRICS' mission has changed in response to the evolving public safety communications landscape. As such, BayRICS' funding requests have decreased.
- BayRICS continues the process to revise its Joint Powers Agreement in order to bring more feepaying members into the Authority and reduce its reliance on UASI funding for operational expenses.
- In FY21, BayRICS will oversee the development of a "UASI-Funded Technology Projects Sustainment Strategy" to explore options for weaning off UASI funds for continued operational expenses.
- Using the results of the *Technology Projects Sustainment Strategy*, BayRICS anticipates steadily reducing its annual funding requests over the next six years as additional fee-paying members join the authority (e.g., a \$10,000 per year reduction through FY26).

The Management Team has completed its planning for the 2021 risk management cycle in partnership with jurisdictions, the NCRIC, and Haystax. Please see Appendix A for the outline of the Risk Management Program schedule for calendar year 2021. An overview of program highlights are recapped below and provided in a PowerPoint presentation (Appendix B).

#### Risk Management 2021 Program Highlights

- The UASI Management Team will hold a Risk Management kick-off webinar for stakeholders.
- Jurisdictions will conduct their annual asset review to fill information gaps and add Special Events, COVID-19 public testing sites, and identified government-operated vaccine distribution sites.
- The NCRIC will update pharmaceutical distribution centers, hubs, and end-points in Cal COP.
- Haystax will refresh population and economic data inputs for the Hub Funding Formula.

#### THIRA / SPR 2021 Highlights

All Homeland Security fund grantees are required by DHS to produce a Threat Hazard Identifications and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and a Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR). FEMA does not require a full update of the THIRA until 2022, but three scenarios will be addressed, in addition to completion of the SPR.

The UASI Management Team will work with subject matter experts to:

- Add two new scenarios: Pandemic Influenza and Improvised Nuclear Device.
- Revise impact data for the Radiological Dispersal Device scenario.
- Complete the THIRA and SPR for Community Mitigation #2 and Threat & Hazard Identification.
- Update the SPR for capability targets in all Mission Area.
- Work with FEMA to improve SPR data visualization and analysis.
- Improve data gathering for the SPR through sub-grantee project reporting and Bay Area Training & Exercise course evaluations.
- Continue efforts with Cal OES to improve statewide coordination of the THIRA and SPR.
- Present the completed THIRA and SPR at the November Approval Authority in preparation for submission to DHS/FEMA by December 31st.



### Bay Area UASI Risk Management Program 2021 Schedule

Each year the Bay Area UASI Risk Management Program includes data input, validation, assessments, and reporting to support decision-making and guide grant spending. A risk and capability-based methodology to allocate UASI funds is required by the Department of Homeland Security and is mandated in the Bay Area UASI Approval Authority Bylaws.

This year, there are four main steps to our risk management process:

#### 1. Risk Management Kick-Off Meeting

WHERE: Virtual

#### 2. Asset Updates and Special Event Data Collection

WHO: Op. Area and NCIRC subject matter experts who are Cal COP trained and PCII certified.

WHAT: Subject matter experts enter data on special events and review and update asset data based, as

needed, in Cal COP. The NCRIC reviews and validates the information.

WHEN: January 29, 2020 – April 10, 2021

WHERE: Virtual

Haystax will offer a virtual training for Bay Area Cal COP uses on February 11th.

#### 3. THIRA Scenario Review

WHO: Emergency Management and Homeland Security subject matter experts (SMEs)

WHAT: SMEs will review and provide input electronically on impact revisions for the Radiological

Dispersal Device (RND) scenario and two proposed THIRA scenarios (Pandemic Influenza

and Improvised Nuclear Device).


