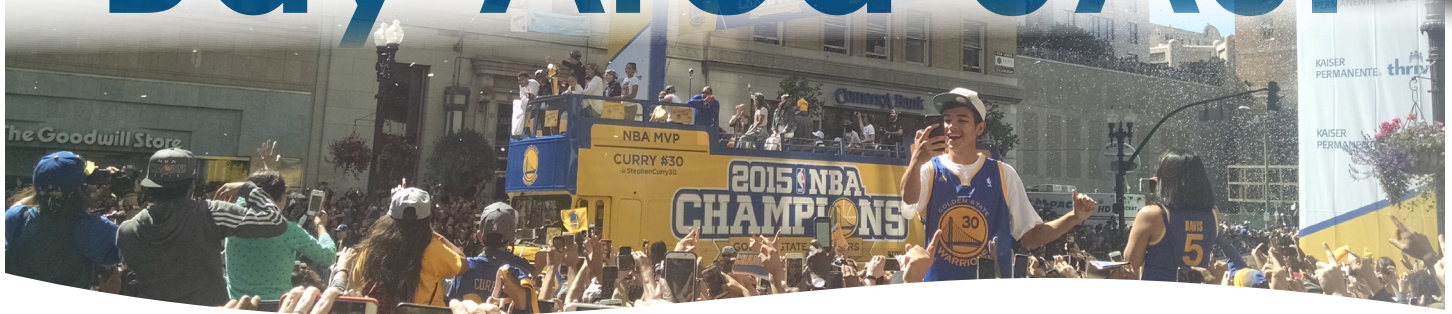

Bay Area Celebrates Safely During Large Scale Public Events

June 2015 was a busy month for large scale events in the Bay Area. Oakland played host to the Warriors' home games at the Coliseum and subsequent victory parade and celebration throughout the downtown area. San Francisco hosted the United States Conference of Mayors, a public celebration of City Hall's 100th birthday, and the 45th annual Pride Parade along Market Street. In each event, Bay Area agencies demonstrated how planning, coordination, and execution allows entire cities and communities to celebrate securely.

In Oakland, an estimated 500,000 enthusiastic fans turned out to attend the Golden State Warriors' NBA championship parade on a route winding through city streets and around Lake Merritt. The parade lasted about an hour and a half; after which fans made a mass exodus to the "public rally site" designated on Lake Merritt Boulevard. At that location, the Oakland Police and Fire Departments had deployed their Joint Mobile Command Vehicle which provided command staff with enhanced on scene communications abilities and increased situational awareness. The Oakland Fire Department also set up its Mobile Dispatch Center (MDC) to supplement regular fire dispatch and to provide faster and more localized response. Both the fire and police departments coordinated efforts led to a safe celebration in Oakland.

On June 18th, Mayor Ed Lee and San Francisco welcomed over 300 mayors from across the country, as well as notable

leaders such as President Barack Obama and Hilary Clinton. Simultaneously, citizens celebrated the Centennial Anniversary of City Hall



with a magnificent light show projected onto City Hall. Coordinated security efforts between the San Francisco Police Department, San Francisco Sheriff's Department, the Secret Service, and the FBI ensured the public's safety during this highly-publicized event.

San Francisco also managed more than 600,000 people flooding the City to celebrate Pride and the nationwide legalization of same-sex marriage. The coordinated effort between local, state, and federal public safety agencies, as well as Bay Area transit agencies, ensured a safe and celebratory event. These agencies coordinated using various data and information sharing tools, including the FBI's Law Enforcement Online (LEO) portal, Cal COP, and WebEOC.

National Homeland Security Conference

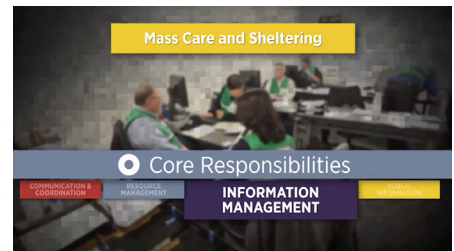
Members of the Bay Area homeland security community recently travelled to San Antonio, Texas to participate in the 9th annual National Homeland Security Conference. The four day event featured keynote speeches from Lieutenant General Perry L Wiggins, Commander U.S. Army North (Fifth Army), Chief W. Nim Kidd, Texas Division of Emergency Management, and Pierre-Edouard Colliex, Police Attaché, Embassy of France who spoke on the Charlie Hebdo terrorist attack. The theme of the conference was “Securing our Liberty by Protecting our Homeland” and featured various subject matter experts sharing best practices from across the nation to enhance our homeland security capabilities. The Management Team participated in panel discussions that highlighted various projects, including ongoing community resiliency efforts that lead to guides for public/private partnerships; logistics planning and stockpile operations; and the sustainment of grant funding through collaboration and adaptability. Next year’s conference is scheduled to take place in Tampa, Florida.

Rad/Nuc Detection Equipment Distributed



The Domestic Nuclear Detection Office (DNDO) recently donated a cache of surplus Gamma Radiation Detectors and Radiological Isotope Identification Devices to Bay Area public safety agencies for use in preparation for Super Bowl 50 and other large scale events occurring in

the region. These devices allow first responders to rapidly detect, locate, measure and identify gamma emitting radionuclides. Thank you to the DNDO for their continued collaboration to ensure the safety of the region.

NCRIC to conduct Cyber Security Training

The Northern California Regional Intelligence Center (NCRIC) recently designed a Cyber Security 101 training to teach government employees the basics of protecting themselves from malicious cyber activity at work. The topics included: best practices on password protection, recognizing different types of attacks like phishing scams, and tactics to deploy if you become a victim of a cyber-attack. The NCRIC cyber unit recently presented the course to members of the Bay Area UASI management team and plans to offer a train-the-trainer course regionally. To learn more visit www.ncric.org.



FirstNet releases Draft Request for Proposal

The much anticipated draft RFP for the national public safety broadband project FirstNet has been released. The system is designed to provide reliable, secure, and hardened networks for first responders to use when connecting to the internet. The FirstNet system has been obligated by congress to take all actions necessary to ensure the building, deployment, and operation of a nationwide public safety broadband network. Final preparations are underway for Urban Shield 2015, scheduled from September 11th through the 14th. 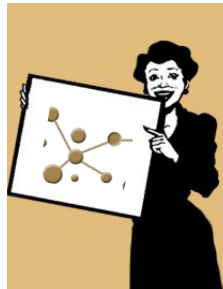

Compliance Corner:

Project Application Requirements

Ahhh, August, and the dog days of summer-vacations, barbeques, the beach. Can UASI grant application season be far behind? Before you know it, your FY 16 project proposals will be due. We all know that grant requirements change every year, but let's talk about one component that hasn't changed-the required "nexus to terrorism". Every year, some submitters struggle to include information to make their projects grant eligible.



The dictionary defines "nexus" as "a connection linking two or more things". Therefore, your project must demonstrate how it links to terrorism. In some cases, the link is obvious- you wish to purchase personal protective equipment for a weapons of mass destruction event. But in other cases, it's not as clear. Here, it's important to consider how your project would prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, or recover from a terrorist event.

Although all projects must have a nexus to terrorism, that doesn't mean they can't have a dual use. In other words, if an equipment purchase initially seems more closely related to a natural disaster, how might it also be used in a terrorist event?

As you begin considering proposals, ask yourself, "Does my project have a nexus (link) to terrorism?" If, at first glance, it doesn't appear that way, spend some time considering how it might. If you cannot, it is not an eligible project.
